SOCIAL INSURANCE NUMBER (SIN)

YOU NEED A SOCIAL INSURANCE NUMBER (SIN) TO WORK IN CANADA

Your social insurance number is confi dential. Only give out your SIN when it is legally required, for example: when you are employed; for income tax purposes.

HOW DO I APPLY FOR A SIN?

Apply in person at a Service Canada Centre nearest you.

A "900" series SIN number will be issued at the Service
Canada Centre when you apply. There is no fee.

Bring the following original documents with you:

- Passport
- Study Permit or Work Permit (Co-op or Post-Graduation Work Permit)

Your Study Permit must indicate that you "May accept employment" or "may work " in Canada, for example:

- May accept employment on or off campus if meeting eligibility criteria as per R186 (f), (v) or (w). Must cease working if no longer meeting these criteria.
- May accept employment on the campus of the institution at which registered in full-time studies.
- May work 20 hours off-campus per week or full time during regular breaks if meeting criteria outlined in section 186(v) of IRPR.

NOTE: If your Study Permit does not include one of the above statements you must request an amendment to your Study Permit. Please drop by the ISO and meet with an advisor for assistance.

WHERE DO I APPLY FOR A SIN?

You can apply for a SIN at any Service Canada Centre. The closest centre to Concordia's SGW Campus is:

WHAT SHOULD I DO WHEN MY SIN EXPIRES?

SINs that begin with the number "9" contain an expiry date which coincides with the expiry date on the Study Permit/Co-op Work Permit/Post-Graduation Work Permit as applicable. Once your immigration documents are renewed, go to a Service Canada Centre with your original documents (passport and Study Permit/Work Permit) and ask that your SIN be extended.

WHERE TO FIND WORK?

WORK-STUDY PROGRAM

Work up to 20 hours a week on campus while studying full time. This program, run by the Financial Aid and Awards Offi ce (FAAO), is open to full-time students in good academic standing and is based primarily on financial need.

CREATE YOUR NETWORK

PERMITS REQUIRED TO WORK INCANADA

Study Permit

A Study Permit may allow you to work on or on/off campus. Your Study Permit must be valid.

Work off-campus with your Study Permit

You must be an exchange student or a degree-seeking student, registered full-time at a Designated Learning Institution*

You will be allowed to work for up to 20 hours per week during the regular academic session and full-time during regularly scheduled breaks without the need to apply for a separate work permit.

Work on-campus with your Study Permit

You must be a full-time student at a Designated Learning Institution.*

*Concordia University is a Designated Learning Institution

Co-op Work Permit

If you are in a program which requires you to complete an internship and if it is an essential part of obtaining your degree, you must apply for a Co-op Work Permit.

Post-Graduation Work Permit

You can apply for a Post-Graduation Work Permit (PGWP) and may be eligible to work for up to three (3) years in Canada. You must apply for a PGWP within 90 days of receiving your final marks, while still holding a valid Study Permit.

You must stop working when you no longer meet the eligibility requirements, for example, you are no longer a full-time student during a regular academic session.
