1. Call to order

The meeting was called to order at 2:17 p.m.

1.1 Approval of Agenda

2. Business arising from the Minutes not included on the Agenda

3. President's remarks

During the course of his remarks, Dr. Shepard spoke of the following:

- Several projects submitted by Concordia to Je Vois Montréal, have been endorsed. This initiative, launched and led by our Chancellor Jacques Ménard, allows citizen engagement in the future and development of Montreal;
- Award of \$500,000 from the J.W. McConnell Foundation to RECODE Concordia, a new social-entrepreneurship launch pad;
- Opening of the Centre for Teaching and Learning in its new space in the Faubourg Tower;
- Concordia hosted Canada's first Global Leadership Experience in November, a four-day student event on the theme of smart cities organized by Common Purpose;
- Donation of \$1,000,000 from the National Bank to establish the National Bank Initiative in Entrepreneurship and Family Business;
- *Biennale de Montréal*, featuring 50 artists, including 25 Canadian artists, of whom 13 are Concordia alumni;
- Given the great deal of recent media attention on sexual assault on campuses across the country, and in keeping with Concordia's tradition of leadership in sexual harassment prevention and promotion of on-campus safety, he has initiated a formal review of Concordia's relevant policies and protocol, which will be led by Deputy Provost Ostiguy.

Dr. Bacon responded to questions of clarification regarding SEL 149.

Vice-Provost, Teaching and Learning Bolton briefly updated Senate on the status of the work of the task force she is leading to determine the best way forward to help our students that find themselves in failed standing.

In response to a query about when the statistics will be provided as requested in the question, the Provost replied that it was agreed that this was not a Senate matter.

Prof. Chlopan asked that the Minutes reflect the point that was made at the last Senate meeting that the cost of a part-time faculty member to the University is closer to \$9,000 and not \$10,000 as stated in the question.

Dr. Beaudry and Mr. Côté conveyed the measures that will be taken to minimize the noise during the renovations of the Webster Library.

In response to a question, he noted that while the funding for GradProSkills from the *insertion professionelle* envelope has recently been cancelled by the government, this is an important program and ways are being looked into to maintain it via other funding.

7. Strategic directions (Document US-2014-9-D19)

The President stated that the strategic directions process will be launched formally in January. His proposal for today's meeting was to hear what's on the minds of Senators and observe patterns. To do so, each table will be led by a designated member of Steering Committee or APPC to stimulate the exchange and note the ideas. While doing this exercise, Senators should ask themselves:

- What do they see as possible strategic directions for Concordia over the next five to ten years?
- What key questions do we need to be asking ourselves as we think about the decade ahead?
- What are the key themes or issues that we need to address during our process?
- What important opportunities do they see for Concordia?

Following the brainstorming session, a discussion ensued, during which the common themes or threads which emerged from the exercise were identified as follows:

- The University must form responsible citizens
- ➤ Importance of inter-disciplinarity while maintain strong core disciplines
- Change needs to be meaningful while being aligned with our history and based on our strengths
- Foster innovation while being flexible and modular
- Processes must support core competencies to prepare students to be effective and relevant and go into the world with confidence and adaptable skill sets
- Create a sense of belonging and culture by building a community
- More emphasis on sustainability and community building with Montreal
- Openness, open access to the city and the province
- Importance of experiential learning and blended learning
- Adapt physical space to foster creativity and exchange among constituents and respond to evolving teaching environment
- Review structures and processes
- > Flexibility in curriculum
- More emphasis on extra-curricular activities

Dr. Shepard noted that these observations will be communicated to the Strategic Directions Advisory Group which is meeting next week for a long work session, in preparation to unveiling the process going forward.

Referring to the letter from Rev. Ellie Hummel, Dr. Shepard spoke of the importance of the Student Emergency and Food Fund and urged Senators to make donations.
