PROVINCIAL AND FEDERAL RESEARCH AWARDS

Newly admitted students receiving Quebec government and/or federal funding are offered a Special Entrance Award valued at \$6,000 for Master's and \$10,000 for Doctoral students. Apply for these competitive graduate scholarships when preparing your program application and benefit from Concordia's top-up funding in your first year.

TEACHING AND RESEARCH ASSISTANTSHIPS

Concordia University allocates \$9 million in funding to TAs and RAs. These positions provide you with practical experience and supplement your income while you study.

MENTOR AWARDS
