"In Loving Memories" consists in a documentary film that explores the struggles for recognition and redress of past injustices in the Irish Magdalen Laundries. Through a recollection of activists' portraits, the project aims to remember and honour the lives of thousands of girls and women who have experienced these institutions, while giving rise to reflections on transmission of testimonial knowledge.

Conventionally, academic conferences adhere to a structure that disseminates knowledge through keynote lectures, papers and film presentations. While this form has proven effective, keeping in line with the mandate of pushing the boundaries of graduate student participation in Irish Studies, we wish to experiment with alternate practices through which we can share our insights. The Organizing Committee thus proposes to complement the lectures, papers and presentations at this conference with a round table discussion. As a group of students representing multiple disciplines and areas of expertise under the umbrella of Irish Studies, we will come together to discuss issues that are salient in modern day Ireland. We hope that this discussion facilitates connections between students, while providing an empowering platform through which their unique ideas can be shared.

Using our knowledge of the Magdalen Laundries as a springboard, we will communally unpack the controversies and challenges involved in reconciling and healing from past and present traumas. Potentially useful to consider in this discussion are the Magdalen Laundries; clerical abuse; the banking crisis; the Marriage Referendum; the present state of sexual health resources in Ireland; the Irish government's response to the Syrian refugee crisis.
