Workshop Overview

In this workshop, we will explore the following questions:

- What is Indigenous research and what are Indigenous methodologies and how do they differ?
- How does Indigenous research, methodologies and decolonizing research interconnected and buttress and reinforce each other?
- What are the qualities of a unifying Indigenous paradigm, epistemology, and theory that is the foundation for Indigenous methodological research design and interpretation? In what ways does a unifying Indigenous paradigm offer ontological space for the high context nature of Indigenous being and knowing?
- What are the principles of OCAP and data management in Indigenous research contexts including the complexities and possibilities.
- Explore the intersection and role of personal theory, identity, and experiential knowledge in relation to Indigenous philosophical tradition within Indigenous informed research design.
- Identify and examine challenges of doing Indigenous research and/or using Indigenous methodologies in a university setting.
