P and I and You

What will the Trudeau government's price and income guidelines do to Concordia pay cheques? Nothing—yet.

Assistant Vice-Rector William Reay pointed out that any university fiscal policy is "bound by the inclination of the provincial government", since that's where the money comes from.

Quebec hasn't been inclined to say much so far. Reay said that the provincial government is still in the midst of negotiating with its public service employees, who have been without a contract since July. And the university will make sure percentage salary increases are in line with those of the public service employees. "If the public service employees get only 10 percent, it doesn't make sense for the universities to have a 20 percent increase," he said, noting that "of course we feel it works the other way around, too."

The guidelines might cause further delays for library workers' negotiations. "If their salary demands are unreasonable," said Reay, "we'd be hard put to settle without information on what the government is willing to give us." By the same token, library workers might be hard pressed to come up with a realistic figure without knowing what the public service employees are likely to get. According to Reay negotiations, as usual, seem to be conducted with the handicap of "information lacking".

Influenza Injections

The SGW Health Centre will provide Anti Flu Vaccine for members of the full-time faculty and staff.

The Health Centre advises that injections are recommended only for the following:

(a) Persons of all ages who have such conditions as heart disease, chronic bronchopulmonary disease, chronic renal disease, diabetes mellitus and other chronic metabolic disorders.

(b) Persons 65 years of age or older.

Part-time staff members who likewise fall in the above categories may receive these injections at a cost of \$1.00.

Theatre buffs can have a field day at Concordia over the next few nights. "Jumpers", Tom Stoppard's intellectual farce, opens tonight at the D.B. Clarke Theatre and runs through Sunday. Staged by the performing arts section of the fine arts faculty, tickets are 75 cents for students and \$1.50 for the general public.

On Saturday, stand by for another evening of satirical fun with the Clone Theatre and the jazz-rock group Mystrale. "Live Upstairs" is described by Clone as a series of sketches on the foibles of man—everything from local politics to faith healing. The review gets underway in Loyola's Campus Centre at 8 p.m. Again the price is right: 35 cents for students and 70 cents for the public. Details on both productions are listed under Events.

Chinese delegation

Concordia received a 14-member delegation of academics and university administrators from China on Wednesday. The Chinese academic delegation was paying a return visit to Canada stemming from a tour of China over a year ago by members of Canadian universities.

Their tour of the Sir George campus started with a question period in a conference room on the seventh floor of the Hall Building, then the groups split for tours of the TESL Centre and the engineering laboratories.

While some of the delegation spoke English, the services of an interpreter were required. Rector John O'Brien described the growth of the university with special accent on its role as a non-elitist school serving a heterogeneous population.

The Chinese seemed in fine spirits after the gruelling two-week cross-Canada tour. Concordia was the last stop on the itinerary and they are now en route to England where they will undertake a similar whirlwind tour.

Their Concordia visit was organized by Dean of Arts Ian Campbell and professor of Journalism David Oancia, formerly Pekin correspondent for the *Toronto Globe and Mail*.

Holocaust discussed

Raul Hilberg, professor of political science at the University of Vermont, gave an impassioned talk on "Genocide: The Final Solution" to a small group of students assembled in a classroom at Sir George, Tuesday.

Prof. Hilberg, invited to address the students by Hillel and the Religion Society, was a member of the War Documentation Project in 1951-52. He was in Montreal to speak to a symposium on the Holocaust which was held at McGill.

Hilberg detailed the rise of anti-semitism in Germany, dating from 1933 to the war years when the "Final Solution" was implemented. He said anti-semitism pervaded all levels of German society. There was not a masterplan for the elimination of European Jewry; but rather the operation was a decentralized one, in which every office became involved.

He described the evolution of the gas chambers. They started as mobile units, he said, wherein Jews in Russia were gassed. The vans held up to 70 people whose lives were ended in the course of a half-hour drive.

The massive gas chambers in the concentration camps had their start as "euthanasia chambers" for mentally deficient Germans. Hilberg said the Nazis referred to this as a "medical treatment". It was only a matter of time before they were to expand the "treatment" to include Jews, Gypsies and other resistors. The Nazis had the matter studied by a university, which concluded that it had no opposition to this "euthanasia". The gas chambers had become a fact.
