Concordia University's Simone de Beauvoir Institute offers a BA Specialization in Women's Studies, BA Major in Women's Studies, a Minor in Women's Studies and a Certificate in Women's Studies. Students can pursue graduate studies with the Institute through the Individualized Program (INDI) or through the PhD in Humanities. Among the interdisciplinary Institute's aims is that of promoting the study and accurate assessment of women's role and contributions to society from a historical as well as current perspective. Women's Studies provides graduates with expertise regarding gender issues, women's history, oppression, sexualities, discrimination, social problems and related issues. The program prepares students to work in a leadership role helping women, children, families and others in a broad range of fields, capacities, and work settings.
