# Finding journal articles.....

- CLUES lists subscriptions to journals
- To find articles on a topic, use a database.
- CLUES lists databases by discipline and by type.

# Search basics...

- Most databases.....
  - allow boolean operators (and, or, not)
  - allow field searching (title, subject, etc)
  - truncation (histor\*)
  - allow limits (date, type, publication type)
  - allow email, print, save



- Connect to *Communication and Mass Media Complete* and *Communication Abstracts*.
- Do a search of your choice related to journalism.
- Limit your search to scholarly articles.
- Save some references in the Ebsco folder.
  
- View the folder. **Do not log off.** Tell me when you are done.



# RefWorks

- Alternative to typing up a bibliography manually;
- Allows you to create folders for different projects; store references you have found
- Allows direct export from journal databases to Refworks (no need to type in journal references)
- Generates bibliographies from your references in the citation style needed.

- Open a new tab
- Go to RefWorks; create an account.
- Go back to your folder on Ebsco; Use the Export feature to export your records.
- Create a folder in Refworks. Move your records into the folder.
- Create a bibliography in style of your choice.

# Database searching

- Different interfaces (look different)
- Common principles – portable from database to database

# What makes a database?

- A database is a collection of RECORDS
- Records are made up of fields, such as title, author, subject, text, etc.

- Find all my search terms
- Find any of my search terms

- ▶ Use keywords to describe your topic
- ▶ Combine your keywords using boolean operators or connectors

# Boolean operators

- AND  
Both terms must appear
- OR  
Either term must appear
- NOT  
Term must not appear

# Combining operators

- Always use parentheses when combining synonyms using the OR operator
- Parentheses control the ORDER of operations

# Proximity operators

- W/3

Establishes a relationship between the terms

woman and journalists

woman w/3 journalists

# Subject field searching

- Controlled vocabulary
- Thesaurus

# Thesaurus/Subject searching

Good for:

- Finding terminology to incorporate in KW
- Restricting your results to most relevant.

Drawbacks:

- Controlled vs natural vocabulary.
- Quality control issues!
