Using Article Databases

[such as SocINDEX, Sociological Abstracts, Anthropology Plus Academic Search Complete, etc]

POSSIBLE SEARCH STRATEGIES:

Some students find it useful to start by writing out possible keywords:

What are the key concepts (and synonyms) of your topic? These are your search words.

Key Concept #1	Key Concept #2	Key Concept #3
teenagers	violence	video games
<mark>Synonyms</mark>	<mark>Synonyms</mark>	<mark>Synonyms</mark>
teens, youth, young, adolescents, adolescence	violent, aggression, aggressive	

TIPS:

- Combine your synonyms with OR, all on one search box line
- Combine your separate concepts with AND, one concept per search box line
- * stands for **any number of letters**, and is useful when you want to find all words that share the same root, i.e. **teen*** finds *teenage, teenager, teenagers,* etc.
- Quotation marks ("") help you search for exact phrases of two words or more
- You can **sometimes** use **SUBJECT** or **DESCRIPTOR** fields (to the right of the search boxes) to narrow your search if you get too many hits.

For example, to search for articles about the topic of **teenage violence and video games** try this:

teen* or adolesc* or youth or young	in SU Subject Terms	
AND 💌 "video game*"	in SU Subject Terms	
AND 💌 violen* or aggress*	in SU Subject Terms	•

Scholarly Articles Tip:

• When viewing your search results, there is usually a **tab** or **checkbox** that you can select to limit your search to **peer-reviewed** or **scholarly** articles.
