CHOOSING YOUR ELECTIVE CLASSES

GENERAL EDUCATION REQUIREMENT

“A candidate for graduation must satisfy the Arts and Science General Education Requirement by successfully completing a minimum of six credits from course offering outside the candidate’s disciplinary sector” (Undergraduate Calendar 2014-2015, Section 31.004, p.143). Therefore, if your principal program of study is in the Études françaises Department (Humanities sector), you have to take your credits in the Social science or the Science sector. Please refer to this document’s **General Education** section for the list of departments.
