




# What do I do when I have questions?

# History Programs and Degree Requirements

- History Major (42 credits)
- History Specialization (60 credits)
- History Honours (60 credits)
  - Thesis Option / Seminar Option / Public History with Internship Option
- History Minor (24 credits)

NB: each one-term course is 3 credits! So 42 cr = 14 courses; 60 cr = 20 courses, etc.

Note difference between <u>program credit requirements</u> (42 to 60 credits) and <u>degree requirements</u> (90-120 credits)

- Credits beyond your program can be
  - Another program: another Major or a Minor
  - Electives: your free choice as long as you fulfill the 24-credit and General Education requirements (google "Concordia History general education")

### History Major

### 42 credits in total, with a straightforward structure

- 18 credits at the 200-level (incl. HIST 200)
- 24 credits at the 300- or 400-level
  - NB: most students take these courses all at the 300-level
  - Entry to 400-level courses is restricted to those with high GPAs and is by special permission



#### Department of History

#### Major in History (42 credits)

This program will apply to all students entering the History Major program <u>from Fall 2022 forwards</u>. For students admitted to the History Major before Fall 2022, see the document "Major in History (42 credits), 2015-2022."

The History Major requires 42 credits at introductory, intermediate, and advanced levels, exploring different fields of history through breadth requirements. The credits for the Major are distributed in this way:

3 Credits HIST 200 Introduction to History

HIST 200 is a First Year Seminar on a focused topic (a "deep dive" into a historical subject) that introduces students to how historians make arguments, how they use historical evidence and other scholars' writing, and how they communicate their ideas. There are several sections of HIST 200 offered in the Fall and Winter terms, each with a different

topic.

15 Credits HIST courses at the 200 level
18 Credits HIST courses at the 300 level
6 Credits HIST courses at the 300 *or* 400 level

### History **Specialization**

## 60 History credits total: For students who want a <u>broader</u> knowledge of history

- 24 credits at the 200-level (incl. HIST 200)
- 36 credits at the 300- or 400-level

#### Specialization in History (60 credits)

This program will apply to all students entering the History Specialization program <u>from Fall 2022</u> <u>forward</u>. For the previous program, see the document "Specialization in History, 2015-2022."

The Specialization in History requires 60 credits at introductory, intermediate, and advanced levels, exploring different fields of history through breadth requirements. The credits for the Specialization are distributed in this way:

3 Credits HIST 200 Introduction to History

### Honours

## 60 History credits total: for students who want a <u>deeper</u> knowledge of history

Similar to the Major but with an extra 18 credits of 400-level (advanced) courses

- Essay Option
- Seminar Option
- Public History with <u>Internship</u> Option: google "public history concordia"

You may <u>apply</u> for Honours after 24 credits, with a 3.3 GPA: contact the Honours Advisor (<u>histhons.advisor@concordia.ca</u>).

#### Honours in History, Essay Option (60 credits)

This program will apply to all students entering the History Honours program <u>from Fall 2022 forward</u> (though students who had previously been in a History Major may elect to follow the previous program). For the previous program, see the document "Honours in History, Essay Option (60 credits), 2015-2022."

The Honours in History, Essay Option, requires 60 credits at introductory, intermediate, and advanced levels, exploring different fields of history through breadth requirements.

The credits for the Honours, Essay Option, are distributed in this way:

As you complete your History credits, you must take at least 3 credits, at any level, in <u>each</u> of the following four groups. Those courses serve a dual purpose in fulfilling both the breadth requirement and the 200-, 300-, and 400-level requirements for your program.

- 2. <u>History of Asia/Africa</u>
- 3. <u>History of Europe</u>
- 4. History of the Americas

# Introduction to History (HIST 200)

#### You are required to take HIST 200, Introduction to History

HIST 200 is a **First Year Seminar** on a focused topic (a "deep dive" into a historical subject) that introduces students to how historians make arguments, how they use historical evidence and other scholars' writing, and how they communicate their ideas.

- There are several sections of HIST 200 offered in the Fall and Winter terms, each with a different topic.
- 2022-23 HIST 200 Topics:
  - Global History of September 11, 2001
  - The Oil Curse: MidEast, 1901-Present
  - History of Mexico City

- A Late Twentieth-Century Genocide:
   Srebrenica, July 1995
- Conjuring the Caribbean
- History of Childhood

### Program Path for History

Start with your 200-level requirements, incl. HIST 200

• You will need between 18 and 24 200-level HIST credits (6 to 8 courses), depending on your program: it is your choice to take them all the first year, or spread them out.

### <u>Take electives from the beginning</u>: don't take only HIST courses

 Rough out a plan for your degree: figure out how, for instance, your 42 credits in a HIST Major (14 courses) should spread out over a 90-credit degree (30 courses)

**Then**, once your 200-levels are done, work on your 300-level and (if relevant) 400-level requirements

- Make sure you are fulfilling the Breadth Requirement groups
- Check in with yourself and the History Advisor, if you want – after the first 24 credits or so. Am I in the right program? Should I apply for Honours? Are there issues I need to address?






### Academic Requirements Tool

- Can I switch or add programs (e.g. a Minor or a second Major) during my studies?
  - Yes! It is quite simple after you have completed 24 credits and if you have a minimum 2.0 GPA
  - Google it or send us an email and we'll explain how



# Opportunities at Concordia to Study Elsewhere

- <u>Student Exchange program:</u> google Concordia semester abroad
  - In your second or third year you could spend one to two semesters at a university elsewhere in the world! There are bursaries available it's a fantastic opportunity!
  - Requires advanced planning: so if you're interested, start thinking early
- Take courses and get credit from other Quebec Universities: google Concordia classes at other Quebec universities
  - This has been streamlined/expedited by an interuniversity agreement amongst all the Quebec universities: visit the website to fill out the forms
