4:30pm - Roundtable Discussion for Presenters The Brexit Club: Boundaries and Borders

At the first annual North American Graduate Conference in Irish Studies, the conference organizers proposed to complement the traditional academic conference format with a roundtable discussion amongst the graduate student presenters around a set of issues salient to contemporary Ireland. This year's roundtable discussion will explore spatial dimensions of the Brexit referendum. Part one will look outwards, focusing on Ireland's relationship with Europe over time. Themes might include continental support for Irish rebellion, the European exile of Irish cultural figures, development of the country's European identity, and/or Irish Euroscepticism. The second part will look inwards and consider the referendum's implications regarding Ireland's relationship with the UK, and the border question. Participants are encouraged to consider cultural as much as economic and political issues, looking at Brexit not only as a rearranging of physical space, but also of mental expanses and imaginative latitude.
