NEW IRISH PRIME MINISTER MEETS IRISH COMMUNITY MEMBERS AND CONCORDIA'S PRESIDENT

rish Prime Minister Leo Varadkar visited Montreal in August 2017 to meet with Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau and walk in Montreal's Pride Parade. The stopover followed the May 2017 visit of former Irish Taoiseach Enda Kenny, Varadkar's predecessor, to Montreal and the School of Irish Studies.

Varadkar also met with representatives of Montreal's Irish community and Concordia officials. He praised the work at the School of Irish Studies and complimented the special partnership between Concordia and the Irish community that resulted in the creation of the school.

In particular, he pointed out the value of sharing Ireland's complex story with students from diverse backgrounds, whose world views can be broadened by learning about the Irish experience at home and abroad. He praised the Montreal Irish community's current plans to commemorate the tragedy of Irish famine victims buried near Montreal's Irish Commemorative Stone, also known as the Black Rock, as well as the inspirational story of the volunteers who helped the destitute immigrants, especially those who sacrificed their lives in doing so.

The Taoiseach also spoke of strengthening economic ties between Ireland and Canada, especially in the context of the recent Canada-European Union Comprehensive Economic and Trade Agreement (CETA) and the dramatic changes that will be ushered in after Brexit (the prospective withdrawal of the United Kingdom from the European Union) takes effect. Since his visit, economic ties between Montreal and Ireland have been given an added boost by Air Canada's announcement that it will introduce direct flights from Montreal to Dublin next spring.

The School of Irish Studies awarded scholarships to two graduate students to participate in the 2017 conference of the Canadian Association for Irish Studies (CAIS), held at the University of Ulster in Derry in June. Helene-Jane Groarke's "The Impact of Socio-Political Context on Identity Formation: Toronto and Montreal's Nineteenth-Century Irish Catholic Communities as a Case Study" won the prize for best paper by an MA student. The CAIS 2018 conference will be held at Université Laval in Quebec City in June, hosted by **Brad Kent**, who completed his PhD in Irish Studies at Concordia in 2006.

Donors continue to contribute in memory of **Robert Brodrick**, an important member of Montreal's Irish community who died earlier in 2017. Contributions made in Brodrick's memory are being used to increase the annual Thomas D'Arcy McGee Scholarship. McGee was a figure close to Brodrick's heart and is of special interest to his daughter, Robin Brodrick, who is currently majoring in Irish Studies. Rebecca Stacey is the 2017 recipient of the Georges Beriault/ Joyce Carson Prize for the best essay in Irish Studies, "'My Name That Terrifies': Tracing the Memory and Martyrdom of Oscar Wilde in Relation to Irish National Identity." In the words of Gavin Foster, associate professor of Modern Irish History, the essay is "an original, intellectually sophisticated and convincing piece of work that successfully integrates a

range of disciplinary perspectives, including history, memory studies, literature, Irish studies and queer studies." Stacey plans to begin graduate work in Irish Studies in January 2018.

The school extends its sincere thanks to **Ann Drury**, GrDip 77, Daniel O'Leary, BA 90, Kate Bligh and Ann English for their recent book donations to the Irish Studies library.



Emer Nic Labhraí is the 2017 Teagascóir, the junior university scholar from Ireland, who is teaching first- and second-level classes in the Irish language.

Maureen Murphy is the 2017-18 Peter O'Brien Visiting Scholar, teaching courses in Irish literature and folklore. Murphy is a preeminent figure in Irish-American life as well as a distinguished scholar. Among her many achievements

is the central role she played in the creation of the Irish Hunger Memorial in New York City. Murphy gave a lecture on the memorial on November 17. Murphy's most recent book is Compassionate Stranger: Asenath Nicholson and the Great Irish Famine.

Undergraduate students Robin Brodrick, Kayla Gasperec and Rachael Hutchinson were awarded scholarships to enrol in Irish language courses in An Ceathrú Rua, Connemara, organized by the National



University of Ireland Galway. The courses ran for four weeks in lune, and each student stayed with an Irish-speaking family.

The School of Irish Studies welcomes **Susanne Cammack**, the Fulbright Canada postdoctoral fellow in Irish Studies. During her stay at Concordia, Cammack, who is a specialist in modern Irish literature, will complete a book on Irish writers of the early 20th century.


2017 ST. PATRICK'S SOCIETY OF MONTREAL LECTURE



avin Foster contributed the article "The Social Basis of the Civil War Divide" to the Atlas of the Irish Revolution, published in September 2017 and already into its second printing. This mammoth collection consists of more than 300 original maps, several hundred illustrations and more than 140 contributions from leading scholars worldwide. It is a landmark publication representing a groundbreaking contribution to an understanding of modern Irish history.






and Dramaturgy

Emer O'Toole, assistant professor of Performance Studies, recently co-edited and contributed to a collection of essays, Ethical Exchanges in Translation, Adaptation and Dramaturgy, published by Brill/ Rodopi. She was recently awarded a research grant of \$53,417 from the Fonds de recherche du Ouébec – Société et culture. in addition to \$22.887 from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council, to study the relationship between Irish theatre and activism. She has academic articles accepted for publication

in Literature Interpretation Theory and Éire-Ireland, and recently produced a show at Concordia with the Feminism and Controversial Humour group. O'Toole regularly contributes articles to The Irish Times. The Guardian and The Conversation.

In December 2017. The Vibrant House: Irish Writing and Domestic Space, co-edited by Rhona Richman Kenneally, professor of Design and Computation Arts, will be published in Dublin by Four Courts Press. This collection of short memoirs and critical essays consists of contributions by writers Colette Bryce, Eiléan Ní Chuilleanáin, Theo Dorgan, Mary Morrissy and Macdara Woods, and other renowned literary critics. An essay by Richman Kenneally serves as a theoretical introduction

to the collection, while a special section of images featuring the houses discussed in the contributions supports the book's emphasis on the Irish home as a vibrant space of personal and national identity formation.

Cupported in part by generous financial assistance from the Canadian Irish Studies Foundation, Concordia welcomed five new graduate students — three MA and two PhD students — in fall 2017.

Kyle McCreanor, from Squamish, B.C., is enrolled in an MA in Irish History program and will be working with Gavin Foster; John Cairns, a Montreal resident originally from Northern Ireland, will pursue an MA in English with a focus on Northern Irish writers, under the joint supervision of Michael Kenneally and Susan Cahill, associate professor of Literature; and Shaney Herrmann, who completed an undergraduate degree with a minor in Irish Studies, has enrolled in the Master of Design program. Working with Rhona Richman Kenneally, Herrmann's research will focus on the landscape and food culture of Ireland. Molly-Claire Gillett from Orillia, Ont., has enrolled in the interdisciplinary PhD

program, working with Elaine Cheasley Paterson, chair of the Department of Art History, Rhona Richman Kenneally and Susan Cahill. Her research will focus on Irish history, the Arts and Crafts movement and economic rejuvenation at the end of the 19th century. Hugh Deasy, an Irish native who recently completed an MA in Irish literature at the National University of Ireland Maynooth, will pursue a PhD on James Joyce under the supervision of André Furlani, chair of Concordia's Department of English.

In all, there are now 21 graduate students at Concordia working on Irish topics in departments including history, film and literature, and in interdisciplinary programs. Most of these students have benefited from scholarships and awards from the School of Irish Studies at various stages of their studies.



he past several months have been an exciting time for Irish Studies as well as for Montreal's Irish community. Following the successful visit in the spring of Irish Prime Minister Enda Kenny, his successor, Leo Varadkar, paid a visit to Montreal and met with community leaders, including a delegation from Concordia. Both prime ministers expressed their appreciation for the work of the School of


