Singapore. Lion City. To some it means the other side of the world; one of the furthest places you can fly to from Montreal. To others, it means the centre of south East Asia; a chance to travel in some of the most fascinating countries in the world. To me, it means a little bit of both. And for the last three months, it has also meant home.

In October 2010, I was at the beginning of my journey as a Loyola International College (LIC) student. I was enrolled in two of the college's great classes, was already friendly with the staff, and had decided to jump on board as VP Academics of the student association. As a program that strives to extend as many opportunities as possible to their students, it seems fitting that it was at a LIC information session that I was introduced to the idea of studying abroad.

Why Singapore? This little city-state can hardly be noticed on the map. Look closely, and you will spot it right underneath Malaysia. Its geography favors a huge economy, and its strict governance makes it one of the cleanest, safest, most integrated countries in the world. Although many things are illegal, such as chewing gum, eating in the metro, bungee jumping, and forgetting to flush, Singapore makes up for it with an electrifying night life and a world-famous culinary scene. When I'm not studying hard at the National University of Singapore, (one of the 30 best universities in the world), you can find me perusing the spice shops in Little India, enjoying Dim Sum in Chinatown, or enjoying a great glass of red wine and taking in

the sights of the beautiful skyline.

However, Singapore is small and one can drive from one side of the island to the next in little over an hour. Thankfully, flights are cheap, and travel is my second biggest vice, after eating of course. Singapore's convenient geographic location makes it a perfect hub for travelling South East Asia. With an entire airport terminal dedicated to budget airlines, the destinations to choose from are numerous. I have discovered much of Indonesia, where I made my way through old temples, rode horseback at sunrise to the top of an active volcano, and enjoyed turtle-filled turquoise island waters. I explored the rich culture of Cambodia even though the country was experiencing a grave flood.

There, I helped out at the ACODO orphanage in Siem Reap (www.acodo.org), and trekked through the treasures of Angkor Wat. I sailed the waters of the west coast of Thailand and navigated through the jagged rock islands and lagoons, *a la* James Bond.

Planes are not the only way of getting from one country to the next. Ferries are perfect for a relaxing beach weekend on the cost of Indonesia. And on bus, Malaysia is only a few hours away. The majestic Petronas twin towers will welcome you to the capital: Kuala Lumpur. Or again, a longer bus and a jetty will bring you to Pulau Dayang, a coveted island where I earned my scuba diving license.



The rest of my travels will take me to Myanmar (Burma), a country that is often boycotted because of its rough political climate and human rights negligence. However, this makes Myanmar a living museum whose culture makes it worthwhile being a sustainable tourist. After my exam period, I am heading north to Beijing, China. From Beijing, I will head to the Great Wall of China, explore the land, and find a monastery or two to sleep in on my way east to Hong Kong. After a few excitement filled days in Hong Kong (with the advice of our dear LICSA president Rich who was there on exchange last semester) I will start heading back to the other side of the world. Back to beautiful chilly Montreal, where we make snowmen out of diamond dust, choose hockey as a religion, and pour liquid gold on our crepes.

I know I will miss Singapore, but not as much as I missed Montreal. That is the magic about exchanges. You open your eyes to the world, to people from every corner of it. It becomes your home temporarily, and some of the people become your friends forever. You are completely submerged into a culture long enough for it to change your perspective of the world and then you come back and get to share your experiences. That is exactly what I intend to do: share. So next time you see me running from the campus to the shuttle bus, ask me about my exchange. I might tell you about the time I was proposed to in Indonesia, or the fact that I never quite got used to noodles for breakfast. But I will definitely tell you to go. Lion City or elsewhere, go on exchange, come back, and share.

There were also the infamous social events held at Dr. Schade's as well as many movie-nights and conferences, which also provided students with a great opportunity to exchange on various subjects with their peers and members of the academia.

The years 2006-2009 saw the creation of LIC/LICSA's first academic journal "The Loyola Kettle" which is now known as the LIC Newsletter. To this day, the Loyola International College and its Student Association has grown in maturity to become an icon of knowledge, cultural exchanges and excellence for Concordia University.

Since my LICSA years, life has taken me somewhere else; it has taken me to follow my childhood dream of being a High Performance cycling athlete on the international scene. I get the chance to travel all around the world to compete. I also get the opportunity to meet with other great athletes and learn about their experiences and about other cultures. I am grateful for the opportunity and thankful to the Loyola International College for all the education it has given me.

Today I am in preparation for the 2012 London Paralympic Games. It requires a lot of work and sacrifice to maintain a high level of performance and push the limits further. I train a minimum of five times a week. I have recently taken part in the Guadalajara Parapan American Games, which was a first experience for me since I began competing in 2009. I got to compete with cyclists from North, Central and South America. The first race was a 20km time trial, meaning you against the clock and I finished in 7th place. The achievement I am the most proud of is the 3000m individual pursuit at the Velodrome; I finished 3rd but broke a new World Record.

After a career in cycling, I plan on becoming a coach and inspire athletes to reach for their dream. I want to pass on what I receive today from my coach, who inspires me to reach higher. I'll be forever grateful for all he's given me.

Today, I would like to present the "LIC 2012 Student Engagement Award" to a student that has shown commitment to Loyola International College because I have faith LIC and LICSA will continue to bloom and become a lifetime experience for all its students and faculty, like it has been for me. I hope this award can serve as a helping hand to bring more opportunities to students.
