Mid-term Exam: There will be one mid-term exam, whose date will be announced via Moodle.

NOTE: It is the Department's policy that tests missed for any reason, **including illness**, cannot be made up. If you miss the midterm test **because of illness (valid medical note required)** the final exam will count for 90% of your final grade, and the assignments will count for the remaining 10%.

Final Exam: There will be a three-hour final exam, whose date is set by the Examination's Office sometime in the middle of the term.

PLEASE NOTE: Students are responsible for finding out the date and time of the final exam once the schedule is posted by the Examination

Office. Any conflicts or problems with the scheduling of the final exam must be reported directly to the Examination Office, **not** to your instructor. It is the Department's policy and the Examination Office's policy **that students are to be available until the end of the final exam period. Conflicts due to travel plans will not be accommodated.**

Final Grade:

The final grade will be based on the higher of (a) or (b):

- (a) The weighted average of assignments (10%), one mid-term test (30%), and the final examination (60%).
- (b) The weighted average of assignments (10%) and the final examination (90%).

If the grading scheme for this course includes graded assignments, a reasonable and representative subset of each assignment may be graded. Students will not be told in advance which subset of the assigned problems will be marked and should therefore attempt all assigned problems.

Notes:

- (1) Term exam missed for any reason cannot be made up.
- (2) Late assignments will not be accepted.
- (3) The final examination will cover everything taught in the course.

In order to obtain a good grade, the student must show that they have a thorough understanding of the subject and can fully explain their reasoning process in the context of their problem solutions.
