## Abstract:

Aristotle was not an "armchair theorist", spinning theories out of his head, who "held back the course of science for two thousand years". And though he was a brilliant and careful observer, some of whose findings were not rediscovered until the 19<sup>th</sup> century, his greatness as a scientist does not lie in that. His greatness lies rather in the systematic and explanatory character of his work – in, broadly speaking, the *scientific methodology* he practiced.
