### Invigorating Citizenship in Deeply Diverse Societies

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June 7-8, 2018
9:00am – 4:30pm

### **Summary**

We may hear the words "multiculturalism", "citizenship" and "justice" thrown around in political discourse but do we know what they mean, and do we know what's involved?

In this workshop, Dr. Gianni will tackle some of the controversies about the accommodation of minority groups in Europe and North-America. In particular, he will explore the main empirical, analytical, and normative issues related to the challenges multiculturalism entails for citizenship, democracy and justice, and will focus on the modalities through which specific public policies are mobilized, legitimized, and debated in the public space. In particular, he will focus on approaches, as deliberative citizenship, which may invigorate citizenship (and make it more legitimate) in diverse societies. He will also address the implications that such policies have on the recognition / misrecognition of "other", and their normative implications for culturally divided societies. The case study of Muslim integration in Europe will be taken as a guiding example in the discussion.
