

Reconstituting Liberal Democracy

Liberal democracy is basically democracy as conceived and structured within the liberal framework. It benefits from the virtues of liberalism but also suffers from its limitations. Since its emergence in the 19th century, liberal democracy has been subjected to several criticisms. These include its privileging of liberty over equality and the consequent marginalization of the latter as a major political objective. They also include its failure to recognize and respect group identities.

This course will consider these and related criticisms and ask if and how liberal democracy needs to be reconstituted to meet them.
