

WHERE ART and BOXING CREATE COMMUNITY



Where Art and Sport Create Community is a student-led series grounded in the belief that art and sport are not only practices, but spaces we build—spaces that hold, shape, and connect us. Led by Maggie Hébert (MA in Sociology; PhD student in Political Science at UQAM), whose work researches and exhibits forms of censorship and silencing experienced by Palestinians, the series explores boxing, photography, and linoprinting as languages of resilience, care, and belonging. Through three sessions combining discussion, documentary screening, visual storytelling, and hands-on creation, participants are invited to reflect on how bodies, images, and collective effort can become ways of witnessing, empowering, and existing together. No prior experience required.
