

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foreword from the principal

After four years at the Simone de Beauvoir Institute (SdBI), I am proud to report that the SdBI has maintained its distinguished record in teaching, research grants and publications, as well as in service to the wider community. I am extremely grateful to all the part-time and full-time professors, Fellows, Research Associates, and members of the Women's Studies Student Association, who have shared their perspective and experience as members of our committees or as participants in our events. Their wonderful contributions keep our Institute vibrant. I also owe gratitude to Linda Bowes, our Program Secretary, and our Events Coordinator and Information Officer Michelle Lacombe: their tireless efforts have made my work so much easier and their help has rendered possible the present report.

The face of the SdBI is constantly changing. We have managed to obtain support from the Faculty of Arts and Science to renovate our fourth floor (Simone's Library and Simone's Reading Room) and from the University to revamp the Institute's facade. Our full-time faculty have managed our Personnel Committee and Tenure Committee but we have had much help from new and returning Part-Time Professors, Fellows and Research Associates to insure the continuation of the steady work of our standing committees (Coordinating, Curriculum, Graduate, Ethics, Forum, Lillian Robinson Scholars Program).

Two major events stand out in the last two years: the students' strike and our 35th SdBI anniversary. For the first event, here is what I wrote towards the end of the 2012 Winter semester to show my pride in our students:

"The Institute is about equity and social justice and the students' strike is fundamentally about those larger issues. The Institute is a place for teaching and learning and the red squares remind me that students have taught us great lessons this year. Just as we were lamenting the disappearance of older versions of feminist activism, just as we were complaining about younger women's apathy and apolitical stance: boom! Red squares, hundreds of thousands of them, bold and beautiful, shouting and singing, asking for a different university, condemning neoliberalism, organizing and strategizing, occupying our campuses and our streets, still being strong and united two months later despite the smell of tear gas and the taste of cayenne pepper. The semester is just about over now, but my red squares are staying. They show how proud I am of our students, our Women Studies' Student Association, our supportive professors."

A year later, in April 2013, we celebrated the 35th anniversary of the Simone de Beauvoir Institute by hosting a bilingual and international conference entitled "Rethinking Race and Sexuality: Feminist Conversations, Contestations, and Coalitions." This three-day conference brought together scholars, activists, artists, and students from a broad range of disciplines and fields to discuss the complex ways in which race and sexuality shape one another. We had over 110 presenters and three fabulous keynote speakers: Anne McClintock (author of Imperial Leather: Race, Gender and Sexuality in the Colonial Contest), Françoise David (Deputy of Gouin in the Quebec National Assembly and prominent feminist activist) and Gavatri Gopinath, (author of Impossible Desires: Queer Diasporas and South Asian Public Cultures). The mega event surrounding our 35th anniversary was a giant success thanks to the collective work of our wonderful students, faculty, Research Associates, Fellows, as well as alumni and community members. Now we can only imagine the 40th!

In the last two years, at the UNDERGRADUATE LEVEL, our programs have continued to attract an increasing number of applicants and our student body has likewise been increasing. Full-time and part-time professors have teamed-up to offer demanding and cutting-edge courses. September 2012 marked the beginning of our four refreshed and strengthened programs. The Curriculum Committee has also advanced its work for our proposal for a new Major in Interdisciplinary Studies in Sexuality (it is now being discussed at the Senate level). Our students have been amazing.

At the GRADUATE LEVEL, our faculty has started to welcome a few of the new INDI graduate students (previous SIP program) and continue to be open for Ph.D. in Humanities students. In addition, the Graduate Committee has pursued its work on a proposal for a Master's degree in Critical Studies of Activism that would allow students to further feminist scholarship in two areas: (a) bodies, genders and sexuality; and (b) race, nationalisms, and states. This proposal should be sent to the Faculty of Arts and Science this year.

In the last two years, at the POSTDOCTORAL LEVEL, the Institute has welcomed a good number of Postdoctoral Fellows. Dr. Fiona Moola has worked with me on a major research project dealing with women and the dominant obesity discourse while Drs. Isabelle Perreault (Institutionnalisation de la sexologie à l'UQAM), Gabriel Girard, (Aux frontières de l'expertise : réseaux d'acteurs et médicalisation de la gestion du risque VIH chez les gais) and Elhadji Mbaye (L'action publique intersectorielle entre politique d'immigration et politique de lutte contre le sida en France et au Canada) have worked under the supervision of Dr. Viviane Namaste.

In terms of RESEARCH, all full-time professors have continued to be very active. A fuller account of their research outputs can be found later in the Report, but it is worth highlighting here that their most recent publications and presentations constitute only a fraction of their work as researchers. In many cases, efforts of the last two years should soon be rewarded by the fresh smell of their printed publications! Full-time professors continued their stellar record of obtaining important research grants with research councils and Dr. Gada Mahrouse made us particularly proud, getting her Tenure and promotion to Associate Professor. As you can also see in the present document, our Fellows, Part-Time Professors, Research Associates, and Postdoctoral Fellows greatly contributed to the advancement of feminist knowledge and praxis via their multiple success as awards and grants recipients, and as authors of important and relevant publications and presentations.

With regards to COMMUNITY OUTREACH, all fulltime professors were involved in the organization of significant conferences and events, and all devoted their time to community service and feminist praxis. Space prevents me from presenting the extraordinary achievements of other SdBI members, but suffice to say that their contributions have been noticed and have greatly contributed to sustaining the excellent reputation of the SdBI in the community. Our Forum Committee has been very active and, for the last two years, has managed to sponsor and/or organize seminars, colloquia, conferences, book launches, receptions, and a good number of other feminist activities; some of the highlights are presented later in this report.

In brief, the flourishing state of the SdBI is underscored by the collective accomplishments of the various SdBI actors between 2011 and 2013 and, of course, only a tiny fraction of those can appear here. I would like to take the opportunity to thank all members of the SdBI for such amazing work and to congratulate students and staff for two years of outstanding achievements. I warmly welcome the members who have recently joined us and wish those who are leaving success and happiness in their futures.








Simone's Library and Research Corner

In January 2012, the SdBI launched Simone's Library and Researcher Corner, an updated resource area dedicated to the SdBI community.

"The library's collection has been reorganized and many of our more original or hard-to-find items were donated to the Concordia library so that they could be more widely available to all students. This also served to free up some space in the Reading Room, such that a third of our space is now devoted to work stations for students that are equipped with five computers. We finally did away with the antiquated card catalogue system and stepped into the digital age by developing an online database that students can search over the Internet through a link on the Institute's Reading Room home page. Moreover, with a budget of \$5,000 last year, we were able to update our collection, adding over 250 books with a focus on Canadian feminist content. The Reading Room has become a hub where students from across the university come to borrow books, learn how to research, and meet colleagues for individual and group study."

During the 2011-2012 academic year, the Women Studie's Student Association (WSSA) was predominantly engaged in the **Quebec Student Movement**, however **Simone de Beauvoir's Birthday** was celebrated and **Subversions**, a student journal, was published and distributed throughout Montreal's feminist communities.

The following year WSSA got back initiated a number of ambitious events including a workshop titled "**The Queer Sex-Ed you Never got in High School**" (in collaboration with Project 10 and ASTTEQ) and a lecture by **Julia Serano**, author of Whipping Girl (in collaboration with the SDBI, Queer Concordia, The Concordia Council for Student Life, the CSU and McGill Women's Studies program). Following tradition, the **Simone de Beauvoir 4th Annual Birthday Party** was organized and the 2013 edition of **Subversions** was launched.



On February 29th 2012, women's studies and sexuality studies students voted unanimously in favor of going on strike in opposition to the Charest government's budgeted tuition fee increases, leading the way for other departments at Concordia to join the province-wide student movement commonly referred to as "le printemps érable." Throughout the course of the student protest movement, women's studies students put their politics into practice as they marched in public demonstrations, debated in general assemblies, and stood together on dozens of picket lines. WSSA wishes to highlight their courage, creativity, and commitment to social justice.

The conference brought together scholars, activists, artists, and students from a broad range of disciplines and provided an important opportunity for feminists from around the world to discuss the complex ways in which race and sexuality shape one another.

Highlights included Keynote presentations by Dr. Anne McClintock (University of Wisconsin-Madison), Dr. Gayatri Gopinath (New York University), and local feminist activist Françoise David, as well as an anniversary gala dinner, which reunited past and present constituents of the SdBI. We are incredibly pleased with the success of the event and expect that the impassioned presentations, creative interventions and convivial atmosphere will continue to resonate with participants.

Lillian Robinson Scholars

A feminist scholar whose career spanned over 35 years, Dr. Lillian Robinson was Principal of the Simone de Beauvoir Institute from 2000 to 2006. She was widely recognized as one of the leading feminist theorists of the twentieth century, and her essays and books have inspired feminist scholarship around the world. Thanks to a generous donation from the **Renée B. Fisher Foundation** and the work and vision of the Foundation Board Member **Dr. Shelly Fisher Fishkin** from Stanford University, the Simone de Beauvoir Institute has created a visiting scholars program as a living memorial to Lillian Robinson.

The Lillian Robinson Scholar Program is designed to attract distinguished visiting scholars working on a range of feminist research topics to the Simone de Beauvoir Institute. The program supports stays of varying lengths for scholars with a PhD. The program provides small stipends ranging from \$1000 to \$3000. Three Lillian Robinson Scholars visited our Institute in 2011-2012 to pursue their feminist research. In 2012-2103 the three Lilian Robonson Scholars were the 35th Anniversary conference Keynote speakers.



" I was very honored to be chosen as one of three Lillian Robinson Scholars for 2012. I was grateful for the time and space to work on my SSHRC-funded project on the state surveillance of women's groups in the 1960s and 1970s. I am taking part in this project with Dr. Steve Hewitt, Senior Lecturer, University of Birmingham, UK. I gave a talk entitled "The Mounty Bounty: 'Archive Fever' and the RCMP" for Montreal students and faculty about this research at McGill University. The talk was co-sponsored by the Institute and by the Montreal History Group. It will be included in a book Hewitt and I are co-authoring. Upon the encouragement of Dr. Genevieve Rail, I presented a more developed version of this talk at SNDT Women's University in Mumbai, India, in December 2013 for a women's studies conference on women and archives. During my stay at the Institute I also attended a number of stimulating lectures, notably one by Dr. Nellie Hogikyan on the topic of memory and trauma. I later invited Dr. Hogikyan to present her work at the University of Ottawa. I would like to say a special thank-you to Dr. Rail for hosting me, to Dr. Abby Lippman for stimulating conversations about state surveillance and to Michelle Lacombe for her assistance."

Public Positions

From time to time, the SdBI gets directly involved in debates and takes a public position. In 2012, the faculty, constituents and students came together to outline the SdBI's official stance with regard to the Québec government's proposed tuition fee increases. In addition, to follow up on previous position statements, the SdBI also published a response to the Court of Appeal for Ontario's decision related to prostitution. More recently, in 2013 a statement of feminist solidarity with the IDLE NO MORE movement was published.

Please find on our next page summaries of these public responses and do not hesitate to contact us to show your support! In February 2012, the SdBI faculty joined with students to pen a position statement regarding the impact of the Québec government's proposed tuition fee increases on women. Published publicly during the early stages of the memorable student movement, the lengthy and well researched document quickly became a reference in the community as it inserted an important and critical feminist perspective into the debates around accessible post-secondary education. SdBI position on Tuition Fees in Québec

In March 2012, the Simone de Beauvoir Institute published a position statement applauding the Court of Appeal for Ontario's decision, which ruled that two elements of Canada's prostitution laws cause harm to women (Canada Attorney General v. Bedford, 2012 ONCA 186). The SdBI's position clearly articulates how the ruling responds favorably to feminist concerns by focusing on the safety of women, protecting the rights of marginalized members of society and facilitating collective working models. On January 28, 2013, a day of global action, representatives of the SdBI pledged their full support for the IDLE NO MORE movement. Standing in respectful solidarity with Chief Theresa Spence and with Quebec's Michèle Audette, the current President of the Native Women's Association of Canada, as well as with the similarly inspiring women who launched the movement, the position statement recognizes the IDLE NO MORE movement as an extension of a long history of inspiring women, including Ellen Gabriel, the late Patricia Monture-Angus, and so many others who have been on the frontlines of First Nations and Indigenous movements in Canada.
