

The SdBI takes position!

In October 2010, Ontario Superior Court Judge Susan Himel made a ruling with regards to Canada's prostitution laws. The ruling argues that the current laws -- communicating for the purposes of prostitution, living off the avails of a prostitute, and the bawdy house laws -- create a context of increased danger for women, and as such violate Section 7 of the Charter of Rights and Freedoms, the right to the security of the person.

Some feminists, notably Québec's Conseil du Statut de la Femme (CSF), objected to the ruling, arguing that prostitution is violence against women. The SdBI prepared a position statement on the issue. The statement was presented at a press conference, alongside the voice of Stella, a local community agency by and for sex workers, as well as an ad hoc group of feminists who wrote an open letter to CSF. Together, the diverse voices represent an alternative feminist view of prostitution as work, and offer reasons why feminists need to support the decriminalization of prostitution.

Colloque: Les femmes dans la vie culturelle de montréal pendant les années 1960

As part of Women's History Month, Concordia University was proud to host a conference organized to highlight the presence of women in the arts. The conference, titled «Les femmes dans la vie culturelle de Montréal pendant les années 1960» was organized by the Montreal Council for Women's History Month. The conference brought together professors from Concordia and other universities to speak about women's art at the beginning of the quiet revolution.

Organized by a committee including Dr. Geneviève Rail, SdBI Principal, and Arpi Hamalian, Associate Professor at the Department of Education and SdBI honorary Fellow, the conference boasted a number of partners and collaborating organizations including the Conseil des Montréalaises, the Ministre de la culture, des communication et de la condition féminine, Concordia University, the Simone de Beauvoir Institute, the Fédération québécoise des professeures et professeurs d'université, the Centre de documentation pour l'éducation aux adultes et la condition féminine, and the City of Montreal.

Following the success of the event, the event's organizing committee was honored with an invitation to sign the Golden Book of the City of Montreal in the presence of Hélène Fotopoulos, member of the City's Executive Council.

The meet-and-greet with Emily provided the opportunity to gain a better understanding of her research on sex work and labour as well as the possible impacts the recent Judge Himel decision could have on Canadian sex workers, labour organizers and researchers. Like all Cafés, her presentation was followed by a small reception during which the public could discuss with Emily in a more informal manner. The success of the event suggest the beginning of another year of dynamic presentations by SdBI Lillian Robinson Visiting Scholars as well as feminist academics, activist and writers who wish to share their work with our community.

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PAST EVENTS

La démocratie dévoilée/ Revealing Democracy

In March, 2010, Quebec's Minister of Justice introduced in the National Assembly Bill 94, An Act to establish guidelines governing accommodation requests within the Administration and certain institutions. It states that, "the practice whereby a personnel member of the Administration or an institution and a person to whom services are being provided by the Administration or the institution show their face during the delivery of services is a general practice, and that if an accommodation involves

an adaptation of that practice and reasons of security, communication or identification warrant it, the accommodation must be denied."

From November 18th to 20th, Concordia University hosted "Revealing Democracy: Bill 94 and the challenges of religious pluralism and ethnocultural diversity in Quebec," a conference that took the ongoing debates around Bill 94, reasonable accommodation and secularism as a point of departure to explore questions

that have arisen within society with a view to inform public debate and reflect on the nature of citizenship.

The conference featured scholars from Concordia and other universities, and included SdBI professors Chantal Maillé and Gada Mahrouse. A keynote lecture titled "Civilizational Delusions: Secularism, Tolerance and Equality" was given by Dr. Wendy Brown (University of California, Berkeley)

SdBIs response to Bill 94

ON MARCH 25th, the government of Jean Charest announced Bill 94, an act that would prevent women wearing the niqab from accessing hospitals, daycares, schools, universities, and other public services, and would bar women in niqab from working in the public sector.
