

The Return of the Red Square!

A new and significant publication has recently settled into the Simone's Library collection. *Les femmes changent la lutte: Au coeur du printemps québécois* (Éditions Remue-ménage, Montréal, 2013) is an anthology which unites 30 varying perspectives on women's roles and influence during the student protest movement of 2012. The publication also includes the Simone de Beauvoir Institute's public statement on the tuition hike and its impact on women. The editors wrote a brief note before the SdBI statement to provide context, and this is what they say:

"C'est LA déclaration qui a campé, dès les débuts de la grève, le caractère sexiste de la hausse des frais de scolarité en démontrant l'impact négatif de cette décision politique pour les femmes. Ces bases théoriques et ces démonstrations limpides ont soutenu

l'analyse et l'action tant des étudiantes que du mouvement des femmes tout au long de la mobilisation. Déclaration phare qui appelle à la prise en compte de l'intersectionnalité des luttes pour une véritable transformation sociale" (p. 33).

A copy of the anthology is now available in Simone's Library. I thought it would be nice to bring this to people's attention, to remind us all of the leadership and vision of the Institute in the work of social change.

Currently funded entirely by the university's administration funds, SARC is committed to working towards the prevention of sexualized violence and harassment through education and awareness raising initiatives. The center also provides confidential and non-judgmental support to Concordia University students, staff and faculty of all genders and orientations who have been affected by sexualized violence and/or harassment. Jennifer Drummond, SARC coordinator, promises an approach that is survivor-oriented, inclusive, appropriate and relevant to a diversity of experiences. Recognizing the systemic presence of sexual violence on campuses across Canada, the SdBI is proud to see Concordia provide our community with necessary resources! Drop by the SARC to access services, to volunteer or simply to show your support!

The Concordia Sexual Assault Resource Centre is open Monday to Friday, 9am to 5pm and is located in room GM-300.27 of the Guy-Metro Building (1550 De Maisonneuve Blvd. W.) on the Sir George Williams Campus.


SARC services include:

- ★ A resource center for information on sexualized violence, harassment and related topics


Fellow Guest Edits Journal's Special Issue

RA Goes to Conference and Gets Involved

Syeda Nayab Bukhari, PhD Candidate at Simone Fraser University and Research Associate of the SdBI, presented a poster at the Pathways to Prosperity Annual Conference held on November 15-16, in Ottawa. The posters, titled *Building social capital: Lived experiences of skilled Immigrant women and men from South Asia*, focused on the sources of support – eventually converting into social capital – utilized by the South Asian skilled women and men immigrants who took part in her research. Examples were drawn from in-depth interviews of the participants who reflected on their lived experiences. An anti-racist and feminist lens was used to analyze the intersections of race/ethnicity, gender and family in the process of building social capital.

Syeda, an outstandingly active participant during the conference, was also elected by the Standing Committee on Student Engagement of Pathways to Prosperity to be the coordinator of the Quebec Node of graduate students/researchers. Congratulations Syeda, we look forward to seeing what you accomplish in your new role!

Journée des Magistrales Brings Together Feminist Scholars

At the end of the fall academic semester, the Réseau québécois en études féministes (RéQEF), in collaboration with the SdBI, hosted its third Master Class. Organizers Geneviève Rail and Chantal Maillé chose a less patriarchal title for the day: Journée des Magistrales. Graduate students, professors and scholars from McGill, UQÀM, Université de Sherbrooke, Université Laval, Université d'Ottawa, University of Toronto and Concordia gathered to critically review and comment on 8 graduate or postdoctoral presentations on feminist research related to representation and the body. The event not only speaks to an inspiring level of collegiality amongst Québec's academic institutions, but also to the care invested in supporting a network of emerging feminist scholars.

A New Lens on a Familiar Debate

In collaboration with The Center for Research Action on Race Relations, the SdBI hosted a community dialogue on Bill 60 in November. This event differed from the many debates polarizing Québec citizens on the subject of Québec's Charter of Values in that it proposed an opportunity to analyze the bill through a feminist lens of anti-oppression and intersectionality. The panel of speakers presented critical and refreshing points on the subject while placing their analysis within larger debates on nationalism, law and the historical fight for women's rights.
