Identifying your main values is one of the major factors in the career decision-making process.

Help Society:	Contribute to the betterment of the world I live in	
Help Others:	Involve myself in helping others directly, either in a group or individually	
Public Contact:	Have a lot of day-to-day contact with people in visible settings	
Work with others:	Work as part of a team towards a common goal, have close working relationships	
Affiliation:	Be recognized as a member of a particular organization or department	
Friendships:	Develop close personal relationships through my work activities	
Competition:	Engage in activities in which there are clear win-loose outcomes and there is a chance to compare my abilities against others	
Make Decisions:	Having the responsibility to decide courses of action and policies	
Work under pressure:	Work in situations where time pressure is present and the quality of my work is critically monitored by supervisors, customers and others	
Power and Authority:	Have control of the work activities or other work factors of other people	

Influence People:	Alter attitudes, opinions, or behaviours of other people	
Work Alone:	Work on projects independently, without significant contact with others	
Knowledge:	Engage myself in the pursuit of knowledge, truth, understanding	
Intellectual Status:	Be recognized as having high intellectual ability or as an "expert"	
Artistic Creativity:	Engage in creative work in any art form	
Creativity (general):	Create new ideas, programs, organizational structures, or anything else that on not follow a format previously developed by others	
Aesthetics:	Be involved in studying or appreciating the beauty of things, ideas, etc	
Supervision:	Be directly responsible for the work done by others	
Change and Variety:	Experiencing frequent change in content and setting of work	
Precision Work:	Work in situations in which there is very little tolerance of error	
Stability:	Have a predictable work routine, duties that do not change	
Security:	Be assured of keeping my job and a reasonable financial reward	
Achievement:	Work in a setting that allows me to progress vertically, while advancing developing my work	
Fast Pace:	Work in a high pace of activity, where work must be done rapidly	
Family:	To spend time with your family and to have strong family relationship	
Recognition:	Be recognized for the quality of my work in a visible or public way, in order others to be aware of my accomplishments	
Excitement:	Experience a high degree or frequency of stimulation in my work	
Adventure:	Be involved in frequent risk-taking at work	
Profit Gain:	Opportunity for money and material gain	
Health/wellness:	To be physically and psychologically healthy	
Independence:	Have the ability to determine the nature of my work, without direction	
Moral Fulfillment:	Believe that my work is contributing to a set of morals important to me	
Location:	Find a place to live which is conducive to my lifestyle	
Community:	Live in a place where I can get involved in local programs and issues	
Physical Challenge:	Work in physically demanding situations, which I find rewarding	
Time Freedom:	Have work responsibilities which do not require specific work hours
