OVERVIEW OF MAJOR

At the undergraduate level, Concordia University's Department of Geography, Planning and Environment offers a BA Honours and a BA Specialization in Urban Planning as well as a BA Major and Minor Urban Studies. A Master of/Magisteriate in Science (Geography, Urban and Environment Studies) as well as a Diploma in Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) are offered at the graduate level. The Professional Standards Board for the Planning Profession in Canada (PSB) processes all applications (except student and Quebec residents) for candidate membership in the CIP (Canadian Institute of Planners) and its provincial affiliates.
