1. Call to Order

The Chair called the meeting to order at 9:30 a.m.

4. Business Arising from the Minutes of October 20, 2023

The <u>Report on the Action Plans</u> related to the <u>Faculty Strategic Plan</u>, which was shared last month is now on the web under the Next Steps section. It has also been sent to the Provost, the <u>Equity Office</u>, the <u>Indigenous Directions Office</u> and various other offices.

5. Chair's Remarks

- The situation in the Middle East is having its impact on Concordia's campus. Tensions between pro-Israel and pro-Palestine groups led to violent confrontations at the university last week. Core to the university's mission is the free and respectful exchange of ideas and this is extremely concerning. The Dean reiterated President Carr's November 15 update to the community on the actions that have been taken in response to these incidents.
- There has been an escalation of emails, some having a threatening tone, asking Concordia to state its position regarding the situation in the Middle East. Taking a position is contrary to the core mission of universities and can never reflect the diversity of positions and interests of an entire community like Concordia's. Anyone receiving such emails should forward them to the Dean. A protocol for triaging and responding has been set up. University Communications Services has also developed talking points for front-line staff. These have been shared with the <u>Birks Student Service Centre</u> and Admissions and Tristan Khaner will share them with faculty and staff.
- The Dean reminded those who teach of the importance of remaining sensitive to power relations in the classroom, while maintaining academic freedom and freedom of speech.
- On November 6, President Carr shared the outcome of the meeting the presidents of Quebec's three English-speaking universities had with Premier François Legault and Higher Education Minister Pascale Déry, regarding the hike on tuition fees for rest-of-Canada students. If the government goes forward with the tuition hike, enrolment and enrolment revenues will drop. It's estimated that 66% to 90% of rest-of-Canada students will likely not come to Montreal where tuition in 2024 will be higher than in other Canadian universities for comparable programs. In some Fine Arts programs, this represents 20 50% less students depending on the application pool. Although the hiring pause is helping to support

some savings, since 97% of the faculty's budget is dedicated to faculty and staff salaries, to compensate for the loss in enrolment revenues, it may be necessary to implement measures such as reducing course offerings, merging services, or stopping or suspending certain activities. The <u>Fine Arts Strategic Plan</u> is a useful document to have since it allows going back to the strategic directions and values it outlines and to work in a collaborative way, aligning Fine Arts processes with its mission. The faculty should not expect to do more with less but to do less with less.

- On November 15, President Carr issued an update on the 2023-24 budget to the Concordia community. Covid and the combined effects of a decrease in tuition revenues linked to international situations and immigration policy, as well as massive inflation, have resulted in the need to reduce budgets in all areas of the university. The Office of the Dean is working closely with unit managers across the faculty to find solutions for reducing spending. The Dean emailed faculty and staff asking them to discuss the current situation with their teams and managers and to share suggestions with Tristan Khaner or herself.
- The Dean addressed the false rumors that are circulating and informed Council members that all sabbaticals have been accepted by the provost, there is no talk of canceling tenure-track hires, nor will there be any layoffs of CUFA members. The university is not looking to cut programs or close departments and the Dean's Office will be working with the Chairs to find solutions to increase enrolment. To address the budget situation, the Chairs and Elaine Cheasley Paterson, are looking at under-enrolled courses, an exercise that is done each semester and that is guided by strict principles. The Dean thanked all for their serious focus on recruitment efforts and better use of resources.
- Senate Meeting November 3:
 - o Main topics of discussion were the budget and tuition.
 - Revisions were made to the Distinguished Research Professor Award. The clause that indicated that the award dossiers "will be automatically forwarded to the University's Distinguished Professor Emeritus Committee" was removed, since there is an obligation of confidentiality for the conferral of the title of Distinguished Professor Emeriti or Distinguished Librarian Emeriti.
- Board of Governors Meeting October 26:
 - o Conversation centered on financial statements and audit procedures.
- Centraide campaign:
 - The Fine Arts Centraide representatives <u>Rebecca Logan</u>, <u>Johanna Mongraw</u> and <u>Selva Balasingam</u> held a fantastic bake sale on Halloween day and raised \$450 selling baked goods made by themselves and their colleagues in the Dean's Office and Student Academic Services.
 - o There is still time to contribute before the campaign closes on November 29:
 - Raffle tickets are being sold at various locations throughout the campuses and you can buy them from <u>Rebecca Logan</u> and <u>Johanna Mongraw</u> in the Dean's office. Prizes include Apple iPad, earphones, Bota Bota gift card, Liverpool House gift card. Winners will be announced at the Centraide Campaign Closing event on November 29.
 - Tickets for the <u>Comedy for a Cause</u> event with headliner <u>John Roy at The Comedy Nest</u> at 8:00 p.m. on November 30, are \$15. Comedy Nest 2313 Sainte-Catherine St. W. (Pepsi Forum, 3rd floor).

The university's fundraising goal is \$200 K. So far \$173 K has been raised from 326 donations from faculty and staff across the university. The Dean is encouraging everyone to make a gift to help reach this goal.

- The Dean is encouraging everyone to be flexible and understanding during the teachers' strike as it will affect the schedule of many parents with children.

7. Presentations

Keywords: Engaging and Working across Disciplines in the Fine Arts – An Overview of the FFAR 250 Redesign

Guests Sandra Huber, Assistant Professor and Area Coordinator of Interdisciplinary Studies and Practices in the Fine Arts (FFAR 250) and Molly-Claire Gillett, Scholar-in-Residence in Interdisciplinary Studies and Practices in the Fine Arts, Office of the Dean, presented an overview of the redesign and restructuring of FFAR 250, the core course for all Fine Arts programs at the undergraduate level. The 6-credit course has been redesigned into two 3-credit courses for which curriculum changes were recently approved: FFAR 248 Engaging Across Disciplines in the Fine Arts (Fall 2024) and FFAR 249 Working Across Disciplines in the Fine Arts (Winter 2024). The guests also talked about the extensive pedagogy training program that goes alongside the course and The Lab, a new space for interdisciplinary research and outreach.

Centre for Teaching and Learning (CTL)

Guest <u>John Paul Foxe</u>, the new <u>Senior Director</u>, <u>Centre for Teaching and Learning (CTL)</u> introduced himself. He talked about the previous work experiences that led him to the CTL, the work, and services of the CTL and how he hopes to shape his vision for the CTL through discussions and collaborations with the departments.

The upgrade offers several significant improvements in functionality with a new look and feel and instructors are invited to watch the 4-minute What's New with Moodle 4.1 video. The Moodle upgrade web page on Carrefour has all the information and FAQs and the IITS Moodle team (help@concordia.ca) is available for any additional technical questions and support. All material will be upgraded from the 3.9 to the 4.1 version. The University retention policy is to keep materials dating back 3 years. Any content that is more than 3 years old can be retrieved by asking IITS. The 4.1 pilot version is available for instructors who will be teaching in the winter term, for testing and course preparation. 6. Teaching with Generative Artificial Intelligence

The Centre for Teaching and Learning recently shared guidelines on teaching with generative artificial intelligence. These guidelines, which have been developed in consultation with the Concordia community, will hopefully serve as a useful resource to faculty across the university.

These guidelines do not represent a policy but have been designed to assist faculty to incorporate GenAl into their teaching practice. In addition, the guidelines focus mainly on text-based generators. Recognizing the rapid evolution of GenAl, CTL aim to review/update these guidelines at least once per term. As the guidelines evolve, they hope to address other forms of GenAl, beyond text generators, such as ChatGPT.

These had the additional goal of supporting us to manage discussions about the current war in the Middle East. They are eager to serve as a resource for us but they need to hear about your specific concerns and challenges.

CTL is also continuing its ongoing workshops that address mediating classroom conflict and managing difficult discussions. They also have interesting programming for those working on their syllabi, or with new pedagogical strategies, or building communities related to their teaching thru reading circles and workshops. There are reading groups devoted to decolonizing and indigenizing the academy, contemplative pedagogies, and they are regularly doing workshops on managing difficult material, facilitating challenging behaviour, and other regular course management challenges. They are also willing to deliver workshops by departmental request. I encourage you to write to them. They have just hired several really excellent new learning experts, with one (Naj Sumar) devoted to inclusive pedagogies and another (Josephine Guan) with a design background and interest in supporting Fine Arts.

RESEARCH:

OVPRGS INTERNAL FUNDING:

Three applications were received and funded for the Aid to Research-Related Events (ARRE) competition this fall:

LANGFORD, Martha: A History of Photography in Canada. Volume 1: Anticipation to Participation, 1839-1918. A History of Photography in Canada is being constructed on the basis of photographic experience, with a publication commitment from McGill-Queen's University Press. Its guiding research question is, simply put, what did Canadians know about photography and when did they know it? Photographic activity is addressed under four conventional headings: portraiture and human representation; landscape and environmental survey; events, as marked on both public and private calendars; objects and things. Award: \$5000.

SALAZKINA, Masha: Romancing Yesenia: How a Mexican Melodrama Shaped Global Popular Culture. This application sought publication support for Romancing Yesenia: How a Mexican Melodrama Shaped Global Popular Culture, forthcoming from University of California Press in 2024, the first in a multi-part exploration of the circulation histories of the global-popular media at the intersection of the (former) Socialist bloc and Global South entertainment industries from the 1950s to the 2000s. It approaches 1970s cinematic cultures in Mexico and the Soviet Union - and specifically, the production, international distribution and reception of Mexican melodrama - through the prism of the increasing power of television. It further positions these developments in relation to other cultural industries (from fashion to popular music) and informal practices of circulation (from DIY dressmaking to song covers). Award: \$5000.

<u>TIWARY, Ishita:</u> Media and Migration: Subaltern Perspectives. Funding was requested to engage scholars, artists, filmmakers, and community organizers to reflect and analyse the emerging subfield of media and migration through two symposiums – the first that will be held at the University of Pennsylvania in Spring 2024, and the second at Concordia University in Fall 2024. The goal is to I) Publish an open access publication from conversations emerging from the two symposiums 2) Formalize a network of scholars, artists, and community organizers and aim towards applying for Partnership Development grant 2) Mentor and train graduate students, post-doctoral fellows and early career researchers working in the field of media and migration. Award: \$5000

JORISCH FAMILY ARTIST RESIDENCY:

The award provides support for a four (4) week summer residency in the Amalie Redlich Tower of the Museum der Moderne (MdMS) in Salzburg, Austria, and a financial award valued at \$6,000. 1. Department Update

- a. The next edition of the Wild Talks Series will take place on January 29, 2024. Our special guest will be Louise Lecavalier, Canadian contemporary dancer. The annual Wild Talks lecture was established in 2017 in honour of Catherine Wild, former Dean of the Faculty of Fine Arts.
- b. Meetings with donors and potential donors will take place in early 2024.

2. Summary of gifts raised (FY24)

To date and with your help, we've raised approximately \$1.17 M since the start of this fiscal year.

3. New gifts

a. Raschkowan Fund for School Partnerships - \$90,000

The purpose of the Fund is to hire a program supervisor to coordinate creative arts therapies on-site at two Montreal schools for a three-year period. This alliance will ensure children and youth can benefit from therapies over the next three years as they mature. The first school would be part of the English Montreal School Board (EMSB), and the other school would be part of the Centre de Services Scolaires de Montréal (CSSDM). The supervisor would coordinate creative arts therapies interns in their graduate training.

We are ending the Raschkowan Outreach Project Awards and funding our exiting programs in order to ensure their continuity.

b. Raschkowan Play Therapy Fund - \$22,000

The purpose of the 2023-2024 funding of the Raschkowan Play Therapy Fund is to help offset various costs associated with play therapy sessions, as part of the Play Therapy Graduate Certificate program in the Faculty of Fine Arts. The donation is earmarked for supervision, coordination, guests, equipment, and incidentals.
