Scholarly/Peer-Reviewed/Academic

Peer-Reviewed Articles

AUTHOR(S)

Scholarly articles will include information about the author(s), their university, college or research institute affiliations, and contact information. Author(s) of scholarly articles should have academic credentials that are easy to locate.

AUDIENCE

Who was the article written for? Is the article written for the general public or for someone with more specialized knowledge?

LANGUAGE

Is the language specialized or technical? Does it assume a background in the subject area? Scholarly articles are more narrow in topic and will be written in academic language, assuming the reader understands the context and subject area.

LENGTH

Scholarly articles are typically longer than magazine articles. The length will vary, depending on the subject area.

STRUCTURE

Scholarly articles will have headings, and standard sections such as an introduction and conclusion. Scholarly articles may also contain tables, graphs or charts.

REFERENCES / BIBLIOGRAPHY / FOOTNOTES / ENDNOTES

All scholarly articles cite their sources and will present them in a bibliography or endnotes at the end of the article, or in footnotes at the bottom of each page. These citations will include all the information necessary to locate the sources.]

Racist Policing text: This blog entry reports on an interesting study which involved many academics, but it is NOT an academic/scholarly/peer-reviewed article.

Prayer, Protest, and Police Brutality: Black Muslim Spiritual Resistance in Ferguson Era: This IS an academic/scholarly/peer-reviewed article. Important clues: academic language, author outlines specific research method, long bibliography of references, published in peer-reviewed journal, *Transforming Anthropology*]

Search Tips & Tricks – Standard Library Article Databases

TIP	WHAT IT DOES	EXAMPLE
AND	Combines concepts. <i>Limits how many results your search produces</i>	police AND violence
OR	Allows for synonyms or alternative terms. <i>Increases the number of results your search produces.</i>	violence OR brutality
*	Near the end of a word, retrieves all words that start with the letter entered. <i>Increase the number of results a search produces.</i>	Canad* (retrieves Canada, Canadian)
" "	For two words or more, search for an exact phrase only, rather than each keyword separately. <i>Limits how many results your search produces.</i>	"systemic racism" (retrieves <u>systemic racism</u> but not <u>systemic oppression related to racism</u>)

Why is Citing Important??

Some Different Perspectives

This is a challenge for all of us: Reflect on the way you approach referencing the work of others in your own writing, presenting and thinking. Whose work do you build on to make arguments ... Who are you citing, and why do you cite them (and not others)?

APA Style: Typical Examples — In-text Citation

Hakkinen and Akrami (2014) found that "individuals are receptive to climate change communications, regardless of ideological position" (p. 65).

Research shows that people from any ideological background are open to hearing about climate change (Hakkinen & Akrami, 2014).

What About Automatic Citation Tools

a) citation generators (Ex: those provided within databases like SOCindex or Google Scholar)

b) citation management tools (ex: ZOTERO)

* Make sure to double check your generated citations - they are not always correct! Use the Library's citation style guides to make sure all the required elements of the citation are present and correctly formatted.

A) CITATION GENERATORS

Many LIBRARY DATABASES (for example, Sofia Discovery tool, EBSCO and PROQUEST databases) and even GOOGLE SCHOLAR, will provide you with formatted citations in the style of your choice that you can copy and paste into your bibliography, reference list or work cited list.

B) CITATION MANAGEMENT TOOLS

Sometimes also called BIBLIOGRAPHIC MANAGEMENT TOOLS, these allow you to:

- Download citations you find in library catalogues, databases, Google Scholar, and on the web.
- Store and organize citations, and prepare a bibliography or reference list automatically.
- Automatically format and insert in-text citations and bibliography into papers you are writing with Microsoft Word, for example.

There are several citations management tools available.

Concordia Library provides support for ZOTERO.
